## A jumping dupák: who am I?

In the so-called *pastiche theatre* you can see a dupák jumping up and down. The puppet has the face and wears the colourful clothes of a *traditional Dutch puppet theatre character*. He is a hunchback and has a hooked red nose and pointed chin. He wears clogs and has a pointed cap on his head with a little bell that leans forwards. What is the name of this well-known character from the Dutch *hand puppet theatre*?

Doepak presents some unusual theatre forms, far beyond the confines of our own fantasy! Doepak is a cheerful, educational and colourful Dutch-language newsletter packed with background information about folk and mainstream puppet theatre. In this newsletter and scribblings you can also read about all kinds of activities in the Puppetry Museum such as which exhibitions are on show, whether new books were issued, and how the website is developing. The Dutch verbs of 'doen' (do) and 'pakken' (take) are hidden in the name of the Doepak newsletter. This name was composed for good reason, because you are supposed to 'do' and 'take' things yourself. The name 'Doepak' is also the phonetic transcription in Dutch of the Czech word dupák. A dupák is a rod marionette and trick puppet. Where the dupák swings his arms with its hints and tips, questions and answers, illustrations and DIY activities. In Slovakian and Hungarian puppet theatre the dupák sis called Paprika Jancsi.
